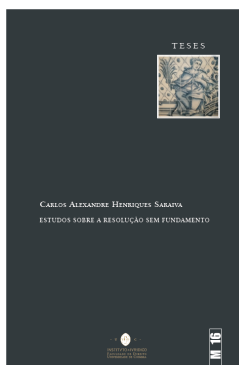

Some returns are certainly painful and it seems to be the case with our newsletter's opening text, which, under fire from a new cycle of confinement, seems doomed to repeat previous discourses. I shall however avoid this exercise, whilst simply highlighting the weight that our present issue attributes to a series of *calls*: calls for projects, but also for publications and communications (the latter still predominantly in virtual environments, but with small facilitating windows already opening up). If we face the challenge of these calls without reservation, we shall in fact be able to fill with hope every (more or less painful) comeback, whilst seriously advancing the (everyday renewed) *mission* that UCILeR's *research community*, notwithstanding the communication difficulties experienced, entrusts to each and every one of its members. The diagnosis of these difficulties (along with the culminating vertigo of self-exclusion) makes us in turn fall into an insurmountable practical circle: only by taking our quality of full *members* seriously (and the responsibilities that sustain this quality, with all that these imply) will we be in a position to overcome the obstacles, thus contributing to the fulfilment of UCILeR's mission as a true *communication community*. Worse than just any self-exclusion, it is, in fact, the self-exclusion that is not accomplished.. and thus continues to wound, in its hesitation and silence, the community to which it is addressed.

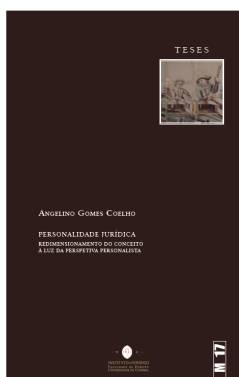

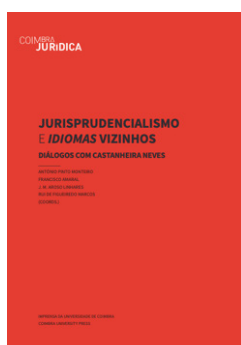

Summary: As with any major Work, António Castanheira Neves's legal philosophy and theory strike us with the morning splendour of a white light, capable of stimulating an infinite dynamic of reception and establishing a luminous (but no less demanding) dialogue with other voices and other discourses (and with the refraction-decomposition prisms which these discourses generate). This direct reference to the well-known dictum by Arvo Pärt (invoking a white light that contains all colours) makes unique sense when we are confronted with this present monograph and with the spectrum of the twenty authors (on both sides of the Atlantic) that give it life. The essays now assembled here cover the capital dimensions of Castanheira Neves' Work (and his jurisprudentialist conception), whilst however adopting unmistakably diverse perspectives and frequenting different frontiers (as well as discussing various diverse projections in reality and the law in action): this benefits the ensemble with the sense and authenticity (but also productivity) of a responsible conversation.

Summary: Activity carried out under the project "Responsibility in Public Health in the Lusophone World: Doing Justice During and Beyond the Covid Emergency", developed by UCILeR with funding from the World Health Organization. The event was attended by professors and researchers from Angola, Brazil, Mozambique and Portugal.

Rodrigues and Mariana Canotilho became members of the Scientific Council as Integrated Researchers, Geraldo Rocha Ribeiro, Ana Pais and Eduardo Figueiredo became Collaborating Researchers.

ii. The following post-doctoral studies were concluded within the UCILeR:

14/01/2021 – Public Examination of Joseane Suzart Lopes da Silva, Report in Civil Law, Scientific Tutor Doctor António Pinto Monteiro. The Report (“Consumer Protection in the European Union and Brazil: The Relevance of Associativism for the Promotion of Collective Agreements and the Experience of Germany, Spain, France, Italy and Portugal”) was assessed by a jury including Henrique Sousa Antunes, Sandra Passinhas and António Pinto Monteiro, with the final classification of “Approved with distinction and honours”.

26/02/2021 – Public Examination of Francis Rafael Beck, Report in Legal-Criminal Sciences, Scientific Tutor Doctor Susana Aires de Sousa. The Report (“The Director’s Criminal Liability within an Effective Compliance Programme: Exclusion and Mitigation in Improper Omission Crimes”) was assessed by a jury comprising Maria João da Silva Baila Madeira Antunes, Teresa Quintela de Brito and Susana Aires de Sousa, with the final classification of “Approved with distinction”.

iii. Walter Reifarth Muñoz, PhD candidate at the Faculty of Law of the University of Salamanca in Procedural Law, has started his research stay at UCILeR.

iv. In the period January/ February, UCILeR remained active in the area of projects, having presented the following ones:

- **INTERPRET-for-MI**

UCILeR is part of the consortium that submitted the project “INTERPRET-for-MI - Promoting Intercultural INTERPRETation for Migrant Inclusion into labour and social protection services in the EU” to the Transnational Actions on Asylum, Migration and Integration call, funded by the H2020 programme. The consortium is led by the University of Coimbra, with researchers from IJ, FPCE and FEUC, and international partners such as Piraeus University (UNIPI-Greece) and University-Colleges Leuven and Limburg (UCLL-Belgium), University of Economics-Bratislava (EUBA-Slovakia), Propella (Portugal) and CESIE (Italy). The INTERPRET-for-MI project aims to develop a model for the accreditation of practices and policies undertaken in the context of social protection and employment services in European Union (EU) Member States in order to promote better access to basic services for third-country nationals.

- **Hate COVID not MI**

UCILeR is a partner in the project “Hate COVID not MI: mapping the impact of the pandemic on HATE speech against MIgrants and refugees in the Portuguese online media”, led by researcher Clara Cruz Santos from the Faculty of Psychology and Education Sciences, University of Coimbra, and submitted to the FCT call for projects on hate crimes and incitement to violence and hate speech. The project aims to investigate the dynamics, patterns, and indicators of hate speech against immigrants and refugees in Portugal, through comparative analyses of periods before, during and after the COVID-19 pandemic.

- **La Caixa Foundation**

Researcher Fernando Borges has submitted the project “Lusophone Sports Journalists Survey” to the Social Research Competition of La Caixa Foundation. The project aims to investigate working conditions and diversity in the sports media.

v. 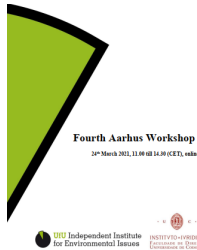

I. Project calls

i. FCT – All Scientific Domains

The Call for Projects in all Scientific Domains of the Foundation for Science and Technology (FCT) is now open. This year FCT has opened the possibility of funding for scientific research and technological development projects (IC&DT) and exploratory research projects (PeX). The former is directed at original and relevant scientific questions or concepts. It will have a maximum duration of 36 months (extendable for a maximum of 12 months in duly justified cases), and the maximum funding limit per project is 250 thousand euros. The PeX correspond to scientific or technological research that aims to explore ideas or concepts that are considered as presenting originality and/or innovation potential and may have a maximum duration of 18 months (extendable for a maximum of 6 months in duly justified cases), with a maximum funding limit per project of 50 thousand euros. The budget allocation for each type of project will be 60,000,000 euros and 15,000,000 euros, respectively.

The deadline for submitting applications closes at 5 pm on March 10, 2021.

ii. JUST-2020-AG-DRUGS

The call is open for proposals for “Call for proposals for action grants to support transnational projects in the area of EU drugs policy (JUST-2020-AG-DRUGS)”. Project applications submitted under the present call for proposals must address at least one of the following priorities:

- to support activities in the area of epidemiology of use of new psychoactive substances, including potent synthetic opioids, as well as emerging drug problems (notably on challenges related to cocaine and heroin use) and technological developments, including online trade of drugs;
- to support civil society organisations by reinforcing their (i) advocacy function, (ii) capacity to make a difference at the local level, (iii) best practice sharing methods;
- to support key stakeholders by expanding their knowledge and skills in the context of implementing minimum quality standards in drug demand reduction (and also on the development of tools which would allow possible improvements to be measured), particularly in the area of social integration and vulnerable groups;
- to promote practical application of drug-related research, and, in particular, addiction research with a view of addressing current challenges and new threats.

The following types of activities are eligible under this call for proposals:

- a) analytical activities, such as data collection, development of common methodologies, surveys, research activities, evaluations, workshops, experts meetings;
- b) training activities, such as staff exchanges, workshops, seminars, train-the-trainer events, online trainings;
- c) mutual learning, cooperation, awareness-raising and dissemination activities, such as identification and exchange of good practices, peer reviews, conferences, seminars, information campaigns, publications, ICT systems and tools;
- d) networking activities.

The submission deadline is April 22, 2021, 5 pm (CET Time).

The *International Journal of Law, Language and Discourse's special issue* has as its scope opinions, facts, truth, and impossibility are continuously being expressed through languages and other semiotic systems. In a positivist sense, speech carries legal protections such as standard safeguards for freedom of expression. Yet, speech is often more than straightforward communication through language.
